


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**Creekview Recreation Center and Shingle Creek Park Improvements**

**What's the Plan for Implementation-going from Paper to Bricks and Mortar Improvements?**

Along the planning process, the Minneapolis Park Board Community Advisory Committee in reviewing Creekview Park identified it as one of the possible "Big Moves" incorporating a Café/Coffee possibility at Creekview along with a larger building footprint. They gave examples of it being similar to Lake Harriet- Bread and Pickles or Silverwood Park Coffee Shop.

The SCNA Create a Community Center Committee has invited special guests MPRB Commissioner Kale Severson and Staff Adam Arvidson to attend this special meeting to discuss how the approved MPRB Northside Service Area Master Plan goes from paper to being implemented. SCNA wants to learn how it and residents can look to partner with MPRB along the way to help make these possible improvements a reality! Its free and open to the public!

Things that are being proposed along with a possible café and larger building footprint are things like improvements along Shingle Creek itself, shifting the skateboard park, adding a Sepak Takraw court, pickleball courts and other improvements. 

**Required Prerequisite Skills:**

- \* Swim 300 yards continuously using front crawl and/or breaststroke
- \* Tread water 2 minutes using legs only
- \* Swim 20 yards
- \* Surface dive into 7 to 10 feet deep water; retrieve a 10 pound object; swim on your back with object on chest to your starting point
- \* Exit Water without using a ladder or steps



**Public Comment Period Open on Final Draft Minneapolis 2040 plan  
Oct 29th deadline for final comment**

The Minneapolis 2040 plan is currently 481 pages covering all aspects of the city from Housing to Economic Development to Neighborhoods and Transportation and Zoning. It is a document that is intended to serve as a guide for developing the City in the future.



Under the Topic of Land Use and Built form, most of the housing in the Camden neighborhoods would fall under the Interior 1 district plan. It proposes **Built Form Guidance Interior 1 District(tan)**: “New and remodeled buildings in the Interior 1 district should be small-scale residential. Individual lots are permitted to have up to three dwellings units. Combining of lots is generally not permitted. Building heights should be 1 to 2.5 stories.”

According to the Minneapolis Ordinance definition, a *Dwelling unit is*: Any habitable room located within a *dwelling* and forming a single habitable *unit* with facilities which are used or intended to be used for living, sleeping, cooking and eating.

**Corridor 4 (burnt orange)**

The Corridor 4 district is typically applied along high frequency transit routes farther from downtown, that are on narrower rights of way, and on select streets with local transit service. It is also applied near downtown in areas between transit routes, and serves as a transition between lower intensity residential areas and areas immediately surrounding METRO stations. **Built Form Guidance**: New and remodeled buildings in the Corridor 4 district should reflect a variety of building types on both small and moderate-sized lots, including on combined lots. Building heights should be 1 to 4 stories. Requests to exceed 4 stories will be evaluated on the basis of whether or not a taller building is a reasonable means for further achieving Comprehensive Plan goals.

**Corridor 6 (maroon)**

The Corridor 6 district is typically applied along high frequency transit routes as well as in areas near METRO stations. **Built Form Guidance**: New and remodeled buildings in the Corridor 6 district should reflect a variety of building types on both moderate and large sized lots. Building heights should be 2 to 6 stories. Building heights should be at least 2 stories in order to best take advantage of the access to transit, jobs, and goods and services provided by the Corridor 6 district. Requests to exceed 6 stories will be evaluated on the basis of whether or not a taller building is a reasonable means for further achieving Comprehensive Plan goals.

The proposed work ahead for neighborhood organizations like SCNA and the 70 other recognized neighborhood organizations who contract and partner with the City is overviewed under **Goal 14. Equitable Civic Participation System In 2040, Minneapolis will have an equitable civic participation system that enfranchises everyone, recognizes the core and vital service neighborhood organizations provide to the City of Minneapolis, and builds people’s long term capacity to organize to improve their lives and neighborhoods.** The City’s proposed plan states that *in 2016 Minneapolis conducted a survey of its residents. Nearly half of the respondents indicated they do not feel they can influence decisions made in the City of Minneapolis. Approximately 30 percent of respondents felt they did not have a voice about issues important to them when interacting with the City. For Minneapolis to successfully implement the policies in this plan and work toward achieving its goals, it’s important to give stakeholders a voice and the capacity to influence decisions. This plan strives to significantly reduce disparities among people of color and indigenous peoples compared with white people. This includes differences in rates of civic participation such as representation on neighborhood organization boards and City boards and commissions, and levels of engagement on issues, policies, regulations, programs and other City efforts. Implementing many of the policies of this plan requires a greater understanding of Minneapolis’ diverse communities to identify and remove barriers to participation. It also requires deeper and ongoing engagement, specifically with a focus on people of color, indigenous people and vulnerable populations such as low-income households, the elderly and people with disabilities. This means continuing to explore new methods and techniques to not only engage with underrepresented populations but to build trust and strengthen connections.*

*And it means partnering with organizations such as cultural groups and neighborhood organizations that already have connections in the community and can help proactively engage residents on City activities. To achieve the goal of an equitable civic participation system, the City of Minneapolis will actively build the community’s capacity to strengthen authentic engagement through neighborhood associations and City advisory committees and to facilitate meaningful resident input into City policies, programs and procedures; and it will work to maximize the involvement of renters, people with disabilities, people of color, indigenous people and others who have been historically underrepresented in civic life.*

*This requires deepening an understanding among City staff of Minneapolis’ diverse communities, their histories, and how the government has impacted them over time. The City will track the progress of engagement improvements as well as ensure that City staff reflects the diversity of Minneapolis’ residents. The City will also help foster the kinds of social connections that encourage and promote civic participation by ensuring safe and welcoming community spaces for all to connect with each other, including parks, community and youth centers, and city streets and rights of way.*

Residents are encouraged to go to Minneapolis2040.com to review the full document and comment as a whole and or on the section that means the most to them. This is the document that will guide the future growth of the City. Let them know if they heard you right.
